2012		Kritzerland issued a limited edition of a remixed and remastered recording of the 1971 OBC album of "Follies". 1st Edition was limited to 1,500 copies, 2nd edition limited to 1,000 copies. Raymond Scott Archives re-issued a 6 CD set of the 1961 series of Science Records put out by Motivation Records including Dorothy's album of Experiment Songs Raymond Scott's four children established Reckless Night Music LLC in 2012 to administer their father's copyrights and preserve his legacy.
2013		Arazol records releases a re-mastered 2- CD titled, "Crazy Rhythm Songs by Dorothy Collins" which contains 56 of her single recordings on two discs from the mid forties to 1963. 2016		The Scott heirs (including Dorothy's two daughters) established <a href="http://www.raymondscott.net">www.raymondscott.net</a> as the official gateway for visionary composer, inventor, pianist, engineer, and electronic music pioneer Raymond Scott. It features a wealth of information about their father's life and work.

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NOTE: This timeline does not include many of the dates and places where Dorothy Collins gave live concerts in some of the famous nightclubs and theatres in the United States. Dorothy appeared many summers at the famous Thunderbird Hotel in Las Vegas. She also appeared at Chicago's world famous Chez Paree nightclub as well as the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles, the Copacabana in New York City and The Palace in San Francisco.
