

# THE MAJOR REUNIONS

Russell and Snooky were guests on "The Gisele MacKenzie Show" produced by Jack Benny on NBC-TV during the 1957-1958 season.

On September 10, 1972 Gisele, Russell, Snooky & Eileen paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" as part of ABC-TV's 25th Anniversary Salute to Television.

"The Mike Douglas Show" paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" during May 1974 with guests Gisele, Snooky and Andre Baruch.

ABC-TV's "Wide World of Entertainment" did a 90 minute salute to "Your Hit Parade" on October 23, 1975. All the major stars of the show were featured.

The 1983 (35th) Emmy Awards featured Gisele, Russell & Snooky presenting awards to Emmy winners. Eddie Murphy introduced the Hit Parade cast.

Gisele, Snooky & Andre Baruche paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" on the Feb. 24, 1983 edition of "Entertainment Tonight."

During August 1984, Gisele, Russell, Snooky, Bea Wayne & Andy Russell challenged the cast of "Leave It to Beaver" on "The Family Feud."

NBC-TV celebrated their 60th Anniversary during May 1986. A clip of Gisele singing "A Fine Romance" on "Your Hit Parade" was used.

A clip of Gisele, Dorothy, Russell, Snooky & The Hit Parade cast was used on May 9, 1987 when "Entertainment Tonight" paid tribute to 1957. Gisele was interviewed and presented a clip of her singing a duet with Ronald Regan on "The Gisele MacKenzie Show."

An episode of the situation comedy "Brooklyn Bridge" used a clip of Gisele singing "The Great Pretender" on "Your Hit Parade" in 1989.

Andre Baruch was interviewed on Jan 10, 1991, as part of "Entertainment This Week's" tribute to "Your Hit Parade." A clip of Gisele singing "Young Love" was used.
