Pussell and Snooky were guests on "The Gisele MacKenzie Show" produced by Jack Benny on NBC-TV during the 1957-1958 season.

On Septamber 10, 1972 Gisele, Russell, Snooky & Eileen paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" as part of ABC-TV's 25th Anniversary Salute to Television.

"The Mike Douglas Show" paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" during May 1974 with guests Gisele, Snooky and Andre Baruch.

ABC-TV's "Wide World of Entertainment" did a 90 minmute salute to "Your Hit Parade" on October 23, 1975. All the major stars of the show were featured.

The 1983 (35th) Emmy Awards featured Gisele, Russell & Snooky presenting awards to Emmy winners. Eddie Murphy introduced the Hit Parade cast.

Gisele, Snooky & Andre Baruche paid tribute to "Your Hit Parade" on the Feb. 24, 1983 edition of "Entertainment Tonight."

During August 1984, Gisele, Russell, Snocky, Bea Wayne & Andy Russell challenged the cast of "Leave It to Beaver" on "The Family Feud."
